

International Merchandise Trade Statistics Summary March 2010

OVFRVIFW

International trade statistics for March 2010 using the data as reported by HM Customs and Excise Department showed a decline in exports and an increase in imports, giving a trade deficit of EC\$41.9 million.

Exports for the period were down 36.1% to EC\$2.9 million. Imports for March 2010 totalled EC\$44.8 million, a 15.9% increase in the import bill over the corresponding period in 2009.

The Consumption Goods category was the only one of three to show a decline in the value of imports compared to March 2009, down 5.0% for the period in review. The other two SITC¹ categories, Primary and Capital Goods showed advances in imports by 107.0% and 8.2% respectively.




Figure 1: Imports by SITC Category, March 2008-2010

CONSUMPTION GOODS

Consumption Goods, which accounted for 56.0% of the import bill this period, a total of EC\$25.1 million, fell by a further 5.0% from March 2009; after declining the previous year also.

The decline in the value of imports was largely as a result of slowed economic activity on the island, especially in the construction industry. The Manufactured Goods by Material component was

down EC\$2.3 million or 24.7% to EC\$6.9 million, less than half of March 2008 imports.

Imports of Food and Live Animals were up this period by EC\$2.8 million or 39.4% to EC\$10.0 million, accounting for 39.9% of Consumption Goods imports. Many goods in this component had advances in imports but the largest increases were seen in cereals, vegetables and meats.




Figure 2: Consumption Goods Imports (XCD) by Component, March 2008 - 2010

PRIMARY GOODS

Primary Goods had the largest increase in the value of imports this period, up EC\$7.0 million or 107.0% to EC\$13.6 million over the corresponding period in 2009.

The pressure on the increase in the import bill was seen in Mineral Fuels, Lubricants, which grew by EC\$7.2 million or 303.8% to EC\$9.6 million. This increase was in part due to higher imports of aviation fuel and liquefied propane gas.

The Chemicals & Related Products component also experienced an increase in the value of imports over March 2009, increasing by 32.6% to EC\$3.4 million.

The component to show a retreat in the value of imports was Crude Materials, Inedible, Except Fuels, which fell 66.3% to EC\$0.5 million.




Figure 3: Primary Goods Imports (XCD) by Component, March 2008 - 2010

CAPITAL GOODS

The value of imports for Capital Goods category increased 8.2% over the corresponding period in 2009 to EC\$6.1 million for March 2010.

This category is comprised of one component-Machinery & Transport equipment. Although imports are still much lower than in 2008, there was advancement in imports with increases seen in goods like fork lift trucks, tractors, telephone sets and other mechanical parts and equipment.




Figure 4: Capital Goods Imports (XCD) by Component, March 2008 - 2010

EXPORTS

Exports include both the sale of domestically produced goods and re-exports. For this month, exports totalled EC\$2.9 million.

Domestic exports were very weak this period compared to 2009, totalling EC\$0.1 million, a 92.1% decline in domestic exports.

The trade balance widened compared to March 2009, with the deficit now standing at EC\$41.9 million.

The value of trade reported represents the total record on customs documents and does not necessarily represent the total value of goods traded during the period.




Figure 5: Anguilla International Merchandise Trade, March 2008 – 2010
